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Planning for AR—the “WHY”

- The purpose of Attendance Recovery is to:
 - Help districts recoup instructional opportunities missed due to high absenteeism rates
 - Increase student access to instruction
 - Enable districts to recover funds lost due to absences

Why build a meaningful AR program?

- EGUSD currently has a 93% attendance rate (23-24 data). This means approximately 800,000 missed days of school.
- Some negative consequences of poor attendance may include:
 - Academic setbacks and lower achievement
 - Decreased graduation rates
 - Reduced student engagement, connection, and motivation
 - Increased workload for educators
 - Impact on funding

Re-engage, reconnect, recover learning—the “WHAT”

- Opportunities for Students
Offer structured opportunities for students to make up missed learning time, participate in additional standards-based instruction, and connect and engage with learning in new ways
- Aligned with Current Programs
For the pilot year, we are primarily pushing into existing program structures and serve students who are participating in the school site before/after school programs and/or summer and intersession programs



What had to happen to push AR into existing programs?



- Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P) Plan revised and approved by Board
- Credit Recovery program revamped to meet direct instruction and ratio requirements of AR
- Summer and intersession plans were aligned to grade level standards
- District and site staff identified to monitor and support the work
- Collaboration across departments
 - Technology Services
 - Curriculum and Professional Learning
 - Special Education
 - Fiscal/Accounting
- Training provided
 - Teachers
 - Administrators
 - Attendance/office staff



Audit requirements and monitoring—the “HOW”

- Services scheduled to occur on every site a minimum of once per term
- Teachers complete two documents for each session
 - Standards alignment form
 - Attendance verification sheet
- Creation of a system for monitoring attendance and AR participation data—Are we getting the right students engaged?
- Monitoring return on investment



Other considerations

- Communication and messaging
- Creating buy-in with students, community, and practitioners
