The following Expanded Learning Program Requirements Matrix was developed by the Expanded Learning Technical Assistance Unit at the Los Angeles County Office of Education, with the intent of providing foundational knowledge and information to LEAs and charters about the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P), After School Education and Safety (ASES), and 21st Century Community Learning Center (CCLC) funds.

Information in this matrix references the ELO-P, ASES, and 21st CCLC funds. Merged cells indicate that the same information applies to multiple funds. In coordinating all these funding streams to move towards a single program, the expectation is that the most stringent requirements will be adopted for program guidance.

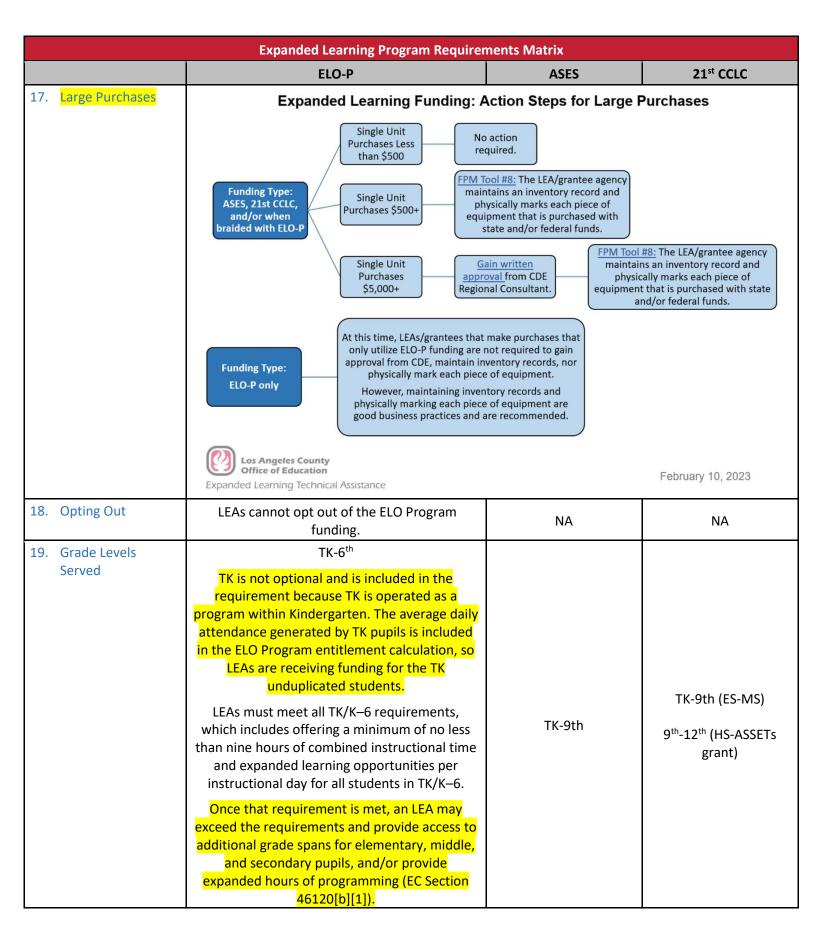
